Mathematics

Mathletics – Parents will soon be able to monitor their child's progress in Mathletics at www.mathletics.com.au/parent with their child's user name and password. You will be notified when it is already.

Mathletics is a fabulous resource which gives students an opportunity for extra practice in all topics and further explanations of key concepts they may be struggling with. Students can work at their own pace and would love to see the instant feedback it provides.

Parents can pay \$20 at the Finance Office using credit card for your child to use Mathletics at home and in school for the whole year. Unpaid account will be redrawn by the end of this term. Visit the website www.mathletics.com.au for detail and ask the class teacher if there are any problems.

Homework – All students are set regular homework activities in Mathematics. Homework is a vital part of Mathematics study as it helps to reinforce ideas learned in class and consolidate new techniques. Students will have questions from their textbook and/or other activities to complete. They must do their best at every piece of homework, check their own answers and let their teacher know the next lesson if there are any parts they got stuck on. Teachers will go back over any areas of difficulty and will work with your child to ensure they understand all the concepts.

Many parents ask how they can support their child in Mathematics, here are a few tips: have a copy of your child's timetable on the fridge so you know when they have Maths lessons make sure they sit down in a quiet area to do their homework after every lesson ask them to show you what they are working on

ask them to show you that they have checked their work and highlighted any questions for the teacher ask them to explain something they learned in Maths that day

encourage them to see their teacher or attend the homework centre on Thursdays for extra assistance if needed

If you have any further questions about Mathematics homework, do not hesitate to contact your child's class teacher or Mr Lo.

Textbook – Every student studying a Mathematics course should have been issued with a textbook unless the textbook from last year is not returned. Students are expected to bring their textbook to class. If the textbook is lost or damaged beyond normal wear and tear, students must pay \$50 to the Finance Office before another textbook could be provided.

Mathematics Competitions – The Mathematics Faculty will continue to conduct the Australian Informatics Competition on May 10th, the Australian Mathematics Competition on Aug 2nd and the ICAS Mathematics Competition on Aug 14th. These competitions are open to all students and selective students are expected to enter all of them. The competitions are designed to develop students' mathematical thinking and problem solving skills. The entry to the Australian Informatics Competition will be close by March 16, week 8 Friday. Please pay \$7 to the Finance Office before the due date.

Year 7 – Due to the zone swimming carnival, the term 1 common test has been postponed to week 9 Thursday. The topics to be tested are Beginning in Number, Number: Its Order & Structure and Measurement. More detail will be given to student at beginning of week 7.

Year 8 - 10 It is the Maths Faculty's policy to have topic test after each topic is completed for years 8 to 10 and most classes have had the first topic test already. Please find your child's result and discuss with the class teacher for detail or further support.

Year 11 – General Mathematics had the first Assessment Task last week and that of 2 Unit Mathematics and Mathematics Extension are scheduled at week 8. Year 12 – Year 12 Half-Yearly examination is scheduled on week 10 and 11. Examination notification and revision material will be issued on week 8. Students must ensure that they bring all necessary equipment for examination, including pens, pencils, ruler, rubber, geometry set and scientific calculator.

Science

Year 7 – Year 7 should have their first assignment on a past and present scientist ready to hand in during week 8. Year 7 students can expect a topic test in week 10 that covers all content in "Scientists at Work". Year 7 will be starting the topic "Living Things and Classification" which investigates plant and animal cells and their organelles, photosynthesis and respiration and also introduces the important concept of classification.

Year 8 –Year 8 should have all completed their first assignment. This involved completing a experiment of their choice and writing an experimental report. Year 8 have been working on the environment topic and will have an exam in week 9.

Year 9 –Year 9 should also ensure they have revised all their work for the topic "Atomic Theory" in preparation for the test in weeks 8 and 9. Students who are finding the concepts difficult in this topic should talk to their teacher or visit the "Homework Centre" on Thursday in which our teachers and tutors can lend a hand.

Year 10 – It is Imperative that year 10 stay up to date with all their work in their school certificate year. Those who are not handing in work are failing to show diligence and sustained effort and are therefore at risk of an N warning which will outline the work they need to complete. If a student is unaware of the work they need to complete they can talk to their teacher in class or come to the C block staff room at recess or Lunch. The following is an outline of what each class can expect during the following weeks.

Mr Murillo's and Mr Pryor's classes should ensure they are prepared for their test on "The Universe" and "Waves".

Mr Dearing's, Mr Flack's and Ms Murray's classes should have their research assignments ready to hand in. Ms Bingham's Class and Mr Jamieson's Classes should ensure that they have handed in their "Ecology" assignment.

Year 11 – It is important that Year 11 students have an effective organisational system in which they can keep track of all their work sheets, experimental reports and class notes. All science teachers will be monitoring student progress and those students who are not showing diligence and sustained effort will be at risk of an N-warning outlining the work they need to complete.

Biology – Biology students have started their new topic "Patterns in Nature" and are working well. They should have submitted their "Local Ecosystem" field report for marking.

Chemistry – Chemistry students need to ensure they are completing prac report for each practical conducted. Chemistry students will be completing their first assessment task in week 9.

Physics – Students will be completing their first topic "The World Communicates" and will soon be starting their second topic "Electrical Energy in the Home". They can expect their first assessment task (Practical/research) in the coming weeks.

Year 12 – The yr 12 half yearly exams are approaching very quickly and students should ensure they are revising thoroughly. All exams will cover the first and second topics of the HSC course.

Biology – Students will be sitting their assessment task for Blueprint of Life in week 8. They should be revising class work for this as well as practising past exam questions. Students also have their half yearly exam at the end of term which will cover all the syllabus dot points from Maintaining a Balance and Blueprint of Life. Ms Bingham, Mr Clarke and Mr Jamieson are available to answer questions and tutors are also available at the homework centre on Thursdays.

Chemistry – Chemistry students need to ensure they are up to date with all work and revising for their half yearly exam. Revising each dot point from the syllabus and practicing past exam questions is the most effective way to revise. Mr Clarke, Mr Dearing and Mr Pryor are available to answer questions and tutors are also available at the homework centre on Thursdays.

Physics – Physics students are currently studying the topic "Motors and generators". They need to make sure they are up to date with all work and revising for their half yearly exam. The exam will include content from "Space" and "Motors and Generators". Revising each dot point from the syllabus and practicing past exam questions is the most effective way to revise. Mr Murillo is generously offering his time on Monday afternoon for a study sessions to answer questions. The tutors are also available at the homework centre on Thursdays.

Year 7

Year 7 have begun their study of Ancient Egypt. This week they have looked at the origins of the civilisation, next week we will look at religion, death and burial rituals and daily life.

Year 8

Students are continuing their work on the Vikings. Each class are currently studying different aspects of Viking society. Most classes have their assessment task (Viking model) due in Week 8 or 9. 8G are due on Monday 12th March, 8D are due on Wednesday 14th March, 8F are due on Friday 16th March, 8C are due Wednesday 21st March, and 8A are due on Friday 30th March. Students are reminded that their models need to be historically accurate, show genuine evidence of effort, and include accompanying text stipulating how they are accurate and why the Vikings designed them that way.

Year 9

Year 9 have commenced their work on Australia and World War One and are looking at a variety of topics including: trench warfare, Gallipoli, the Western Front and the Anzac Legend. They will soon be receiving their assessment tasks which will involve making an enlistment poster, and completing an essay relating to Gallipoli. This will be due in Week 10.

Elective

The topic for this term is Terrible Tyrants, student will focus on Hitler and the Rise of the Nazis. They will have an assessment task distributed this week, this will be an exam in week 10.

Year 10

Students are beginning the term with the topic – "Changing Rights and Freedoms of Indigenous Australians". Within this topic we will look at the Stolen Generation, various important protest movements, the 1967 Referendum and the impact of Gough Whitlam in the fight for rights and freedoms of Aboriginal peoples. In class this week students will receive an assessment notification for their first task – this is a research task on

the Aboriginal Protest Movements due in Week 10, in Week 11 they will complete an in class test that will include multiple choice questions, source questions and an extended response on the Changing Rights and Freedoms of Indigenous Australians.

Elective

The focus for this term is Terrorism in our Times. Students are currently studying the history of terrorism with a brief look at various Terrorist Organisations. The focus will be on al Qaeda and 9/11. Their assessment task notification has been distributed; this assessment will be an exam in Week 10.

Year 11

Modern History –We begin the year with the focus on Revolutions. Mr Mansell's class is studying the American Civil War, Mr Cook and Ms Hawkins' classes will focus on the French Revolution. Students will receive their first assessment notice in class this week. The task will be an in class exam and there will be source based questions and an extended response.

Ancient History —Over the next fortnight students will complete the topic History of Archaeology & Science. They will move on to the case study of Tutankhamun.

Society and Culture-Society and Culture is a conceptually based course that promotes students' awareness of the cultural continuities and changes within societies and cultures. We begin with the focus on important concepts and how they interact with each other. Students will apply these concepts to news articles and film. They will also learn to apply various social and cultural research methodologies. Students will apply these concepts to the Amish and they will complete a cross-cultural comparison between the Amish culture and their own lives. Students have received their first assessment task this is a primary and secondary research task. Students will apply the research methodologies we have learnt in class to investigate how adolescents use technology to communicate. They will then write a report on their findings. Over the next week students will begin their second topic of Personal and Social Identity.

Studies of Religion- Year 11 have started their topic on Christianity. Over the next two weeks we will be looking at the development of early Christianity, Jesus as the model for the religion, and major variants within Christianity. The first assessment task is due Tuesday 20th March. All students have been given instruction on this within class and they should have completed at least half of it by this stage.

Year 12

Modern History – In class we have looking at Weimar Republic and it's fall/ impact of depression- moving on to rise of Hitler and Nazi party. The half yearly exam will comprise of a HSC style Section 1 on World War 1 and then 2 essays on Germany.

Ancient History —have completed their second assessment task in the HSC and should now be studying for their half-yearly exams in Weeks 10 and 11. The exam in Ancient History will be on the two topics covered to this date: The Greek World, 500-440 BC (the Persian Wars), and Spartan Society to the Battle of Leuctra, 371 BC. By now, students should be developing their own study style based on what works for them and are encouraged to be reviewing course work on a weekly basis. Ms Pollock and Mr Mansell are always available for assistance, both with course content and with study techniques. In class students will be looking at Spartan economy and cultural life before engaging in some pre-exam revision.

Society and Culture- Assessment tasks on the Depth Study of "Popular Culture", with the focus on Teen Film are due in week 7. Students are also expected to be working on their PIPs. We will start some revision for the Half Yearly Exams – Section 1 "Social and Cultural Continuity and Change" will include objective response questions, short answer questions and a 1 page response question – the focus for this section is concepts, research methodologies and our culture study of Vietnam. Section 2 and 3 will focus on Popular Culture – students will answer a structured essay and also a formal essay.

Languages

Year 7

Italian

7F Students will sit for their exams over the next two weeks. They finished their units of work and also had an opportunity to practise their skills using practice exam papers. They should get good marks! Every student received exam notifications two weeks ago, so they know their exam timetable.

Japanese

Year 7 have just completed Unit 1 "Mark arrives in Japan". They did a Unit test in Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing. They have watched (7A) or will next watch (7D) a video on Tokyo, answering questions about the people, places of interest and sites to see.

Year 8

Italian

Year 8A/8G

Students are commencing a new unit of work titled 'About Me'. They will learn how to communicate using language relating to topics such as age, nationality, spoken language(s), likes/ dislikes, physical appearance and personality. In the culture component of the course the focus will be on Italian cities and their famous landmarks as well as Italian dialects. A culture assignment written in English and based on this topic is due at the end of week 10.

RC.

Students will sit for their exams. They finished their units of work and also had an opportunity to practise their skills using practice exam papers. Every student received exam notifications two weeks ago, so they know their exam timetable.

Japanese

Year 8 Japanese are beginning Unit 4 Mark in Kyoto. They are learning about the seasons and climate in Japan, what Japanese eat for breakfast (traditional and Western style) and the expressions associated with these. Jim Medcalf has just returned from Tokyo so he has regaled the class (8D) with his Foreign Correspondent experiences.

Russian

8F

Students will sit for their exams. They almost finished their units of work and also had an opportunity to practise their skills using practice exam papers. Every student received exam notifications two weeks ago, so they know their exam timetable.

Year 9

Italian

Are learning common verbs for getting up, exiting, going to places, having, being, working, making, doing various activities. They are engaged in doing cloze exercises, describing others, learning about school life in Italy, using the formal and informal form of "you", and common vocabulary to do with daily life at school and home.

Japanese

Have just completed their presentations on Japanese culture, history and geography. What a fine depth of knowledge they shared with all of the class, encouraged by questions from the floor and from the teacher. They are learning to ask and respond to matters concerning age, telephone numbers and time.

Year 9 Philosophy

Students will continue exploring the philosophical concept of Morality and will start learning the theory of Moral Subjectivism. They will try to answer a very difficult question: "Is morality a matter of taste or a matter of fact? by using logical arguments. Philosophers do not use emotions, only logic! It is time to be strong! By March, 19 students are to submit their homework. I hope that many students will make their way out of "the Plato' cave."

PDHPE

All students from years 7 – 10 have been issued with a detailed scope and sequence that explains at length what students are doing each term in the theoretical and practical components of this course. Students have also been issued with a "PDHPE GENERAL INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS AT RBSC" sheet. This details the requirements in PDHPE in relation to uniform, theory lessons, homework, assignments and student conduct.

Year 7

Year 7 are completing a unit entitled "Facing New Challenges" in the theoretical component of this course. In this unit students will look at starting at a secondary school, changes and challenges, as well as the schools bullying policy. In the practical component of this course the students are enjoying participating in getting to know you games and later in the term they will be learning and creating their own gymnastics routines. The second assignment will issued within this two week period. The Collage assignments are currently being marked and will be returned within the next two weeks.

Year 8

Year 8 are completing a unit entitled "Lifelong Physical Activity" in the theoretical component of this course. In this unit students will look at developing an understanding of the benefits of a physical lifestyle as well as learning about health and skill related components of fitness. In the practical component of this course the

students are enjoying participating in fitness/mini Olympics and later in the term they will be involved in learning and playing volleyball. Their assignment for the theoretical component of this course has been issued.

Year 9

Year 9 are exploring the issues involved in the "Individual and Community Health" unit. This involves looking at health consumerism, nutrition, drugs and sexual health. In the practical component of this course the students are enjoying participating in a fitness testing/athletics unit that looks at exploring students fitness levels in relation to athletics. The Year 9 selective cohort are very fortunate to be able to learn the latest information and developments in the area of nutrition from a leading expert, Ms Libby Babet. This information session will be delivered during the next two weeks. Their assignment for the theoretical component of this course has been issued and is due within the next two weeks.

Year 10

Year 10 are exploring the issues involved in the "Life's Challenges" unit in the theoretical component of this subject. This includes exploring issues within drug use and sexual health. In the practical component of this course the students are enjoying and competing in summer games such as cricket, softball, tennis and volleyball. Their assignment for the theoretical component of this course has been issued in weeks 9 or 10.

Year 11

This years Year 11 PDHPE cohort will be the second group to complete the revised syllabus. All students have been issued with this revised syllabus. They have also been issued with their 2011 assessment schedule. Mr Pappadakis is enjoying teaching this studios group of students. Their first assessment task for this year has been issued and is due on Monday 19th March.

Year 12

Have started the Core 2 topic of Factors Affecting Performance. Imagine all of things an elite athlete needs to do to be at the top of their sport and that is what this group of students are studying. Topics include; how does training affect performance, sport psychology, nutrition, recovery strategies, skills and performance. These students should be spending a minimum of thirty minutes a night on PDHPE work alone ... they have all promised to do this! Their first assessment task for this year has been issued and is due the first week back of Term two.

Year 12 SLR

Mr Godby will teach this cohort of students in 2012. They will be completing an exciting and dynamic range of topics that embraces a wide range of sport, lifestyle and recreational issues. During term one this class is completing their Surf Survival Certificate.

Year 9 PASS

Mr Pappadakis will be teaching the Year 9 PASS course. These students have been issued with a detailed Scope and Sequence which explains what they will be taught throughout the year. In Term One they will explore the History of Sport in the theoretical component of this course. In the practical component of this course they will be exploring Australian sports such as aboriginal games, OZ tag, cricket and Aussie Rules.

Year 10 PASS

Mr Godby will continue to teach the two Year 10 PASS classes in 2012. These students have been issued with a detailed Scope and Sequence which explains what they will be taught throughout the year. In Term One they will explore Coaching which will involve students examining the qualities of effective coaching. This will include the coaching roles and responsibilities as well as the ethics of coaching. Students have been issued with their practical coaching assignment which has them teaching two drills to the class of a particular skill in their chosen sport. This cohort is being issued with their first assignment for the year in the week beginning Monday 12th March.

Music 2 have a composition task due on Friday March 16, an elective assessment due March 21 with sight singing test and Performance assessment due at Music Night March 22.

Year 11

Music 2 have a Musicology Assessment task due Monday March 19.

Year 10

Performance tests are continuing into Week 8 with a written test due March 16.

Year 9

Classes have a Composition task due Week 9.

Year 8 are continuing the study of the Blues.

Year 7 will continue their performance tasks on guitar in Week 8

VISUAL ARTS

Year 12

Task No 2 - Body of Work (40% completed) and VAPD - are due in Week 9.

Year 11 Students have received Both Written and Practical tasks due in Week 11. They must be developing their Mini Body of Work using 2 modernist styles and students should be studying all notes given in class plus additional research on the Modernists styles. If there are any parents who wish to donate this type of equipment to our Photography department, Visual Arts will be incredibly grateful. Students will also be learning about Digital Photography and will also undertake some digital Photography lessons.

Year 7

Geography

Students are studying 'World heritage sites' and have a skills test in Week 10.

Students have homework due each fortnight. 7A – Friday Week B, 7C – Thursday Week A and 7G fortnightly throughout the term. Books will be collected for marking by the end of Term 1.

Year 8

Geography

Students are comepleting Globalisation and starting Geographica skills in class. There will be an exam in Week 10 based on skills (latitude/longitude, direction and scale) and Globalisation terms and concepts. Books will be collected for marking in week 10 of Term 1.

Year 9

Geography

Students are studying Australia's natural hazards. Students have completed a persuasive writing task on Australian landforms and will be completing a geographic skills and content exam in Week 10.

Commerce

Students have an assessment task on prototype development due in Week 9...

Year 10

Geography

Students are studying a new topic called Coastal Management in depth. Students have a research/fieldwork task on coastal management due in Week 10 which will be based around a fieldtrip to Collaroy/Narrabeen Beach.

Commerce

Enjoying last topic society. Studetns watched a video on youth employment in China and are accessing different websites for information on the Law system in Australia.

Year 11

Economics

Assessment Task 1 – Australias economy is to be worked on as it is due in 3 weeks time. Homework has been given in a booklet. It is due every Friday lesson.

Geography

Students have homework due each Monday. They are studying Biophysical Interactions looking at Coastal Environments in detail. They have been given their Senior Geography Project proforma and should be in the process of selecting atopic based on their personal interests and location.

Legal Studies

Students in this course have just completed the topics: Basic Legal Concepts, Sources of Australian Contemporary Law (common law, statute law and constitutional law), Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples' Customary Law and International Law. Our next topic is 'Classification of the law'. Students should be working on their first assessment task. Part A of this task is a webquest and is due on Monday ^{19th} March – week 9. Part B is an in class written report which will take place on Friday ^{27th} April – week 1 Term 2.

Business Studies

Assessment task to be completed on Monday in class. This report is a Business report on a case study. Students have practiced this style of writing in class and the task will cover information presented in class.

Year 12

Economics

Assessment Task 2 skills test is on Thursday 22nd March (Chapter 2, 4 and 6) Students need to use weekend for Trial HSC packs to prepare for Task 2 and Task 3 Half yearly exams.

Geography

Students have homework due each Monday. They are studying Urban Places looking at Sydney in detail. Students had a great time despite the rain on their fieldtrip looking at Sydney's suburbs looking at the different urban dynamics that operate around Sydney. Students are completing Assessment Task 2 – their fieldtrip report on 'Urban Dymanics of Sydney' Students will then prepare for the Half yearly Exams which commence in Week 10. This exam will cover the topics 'Ecosystems at Risk' and 'World Cities' and will comprise of: 15 multiple choice questions.

Short answer questions on 'Ecosystems at Risk' and 'World Cities' to the value of 40 marks One extended response question on 'Ecosystems at Risk' to the value of 20 marks.

Legal Studies

Students in this course have just completed Assessment Task 2 – a class speech and report on a contemporary Human Rights issue. In class we are completing the topic – Human Rights and will then prepare for the Half year Exams which commence in Week 10. This exam will cover the topics 'Crime' and 'Human Rights' and will comprise of:

30 multiple choice questions to the value of 30 marks (20 on Crime and 10 on Human Rights).

Short answer questions on Human Rights to the value of 15 marks

One extended response question on crime to the value of 15 marks.

Student Attendance at School.

<u>Attendance</u> is recorded each day. As a parent or caregiver you are responsible for ensuring your child attends school every day, including sports days unless your child:

has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably these should be made after school or during holidays)

is required to attend a recognised religious holiday

is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral) is sick, or has an infectious illness.

Students need to attend school regularly to meet the syllabus requirements.

If you are having difficulty getting your child to attend school regularly, you might like to talk to your childs' Year Adviser or the school counsellor.

If your child has to be absent from school for any reason, including arriving late or leaving early, please explain the reason by phone, email, or written note as soon as possible. Please note that our attendance records are a legal document, as such this document can only be altered within a 14 day period.

Planning a long term absence?

We prefer that family trips be undertaken during the school holiday period. However if you are planning for your child to be absent from school for a protracted period please send a note addressed to the COLLEGE PRINCIPAL, Mr Jim Linton requesting leave from school. Please state the reason for this trip. From here you will be required to fill out DEC paperwork requesting "exemption from school" and have this returned to the school PRIOR to departure.

Medical Information

Recently we have received a reported case of chicken pox in the school. If you are concerned your child is exhibiting the following symptoms, consult your GP.

Chickenpox begins with a sudden onset of slight fever, runny nose, feeling generally unwell and a skin rash. The rash usually begins as small lumps that turn into blisters and then scabs.

The rash appears over three to four days. At any one time, the lesions of the rash vary in stages of development.

Symptoms usually occur two weeks after exposure to the virus.
